

Outcome-Based Practice

This approach focuses on the end-results or the impacts of service delivered to an individual's life. Hence, outcome-based services aim at fulfilling the priorities set by the users and those that are deemed necessary to them (Kundart, 2012). This type of care puts the subject or the beneficiary of the healthcare as the central focus and avoid the use of generic prescription to all the patients. Hence, the approach is associated with quality service provision to each, and ensure that one gets the adequate care required.

Approaches to Outcome-Based Practice

Result-based accountability utilizes data in decision-making, to help the organizations to identify and take the necessary action to counter it (Kundart, 2012). This program is being used by practitioners to improve the living conditions of the particular aspect of the environment such as the children, through activities such as maintaining a clean and safe neighborhood. The nurses are held accountable for the feedback given by the patients they serve.

A logic model is utilized mostly in organizations that are not profit oriented. It uses graphs to indicate the interaction between the activities, resources, outputs and the outcome of a set program (Kundart, 2012). The Logic model program provides indicators of outputs and the results of performance. It utilizes processes such as Key Performance Indicators, Balanced Scorecard Systems and Critical success factors to monitor, measure and report the efficiency, cost, speed, and quality of the processes adopted.

Effect of Legislation and Policy on Outcome Based Practice

The involvement of the government in this approach aims at ensuring that all the outlines of the practice are followed. For instance, regulations have been enacted to ensure that the protection and care for the vulnerable population such as the elderly and children are maintained (Meßerschmidt, 2016). The policies adopted by the state helps in eliminating inequalities and discrimination by gender, race, sexuality and economic status.
